

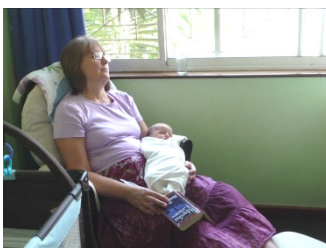

## A New Assignment After Vicarage

The end of Shauen's vicarage (internship) is rapidly approaching, officially ending on April 30th, 2010. Shauen has been serving in a convertible vicarage, an assignment that would most likely convert to his first call after the time of vicarage is complete. So as we approach the conclusion of this important time of training and testing we've been looking towards the future—what will happen after April 30th?

Only in the last few weeks was that question answered. Our overseer in this area, Rev. Claude Houge, recently traveled to Uganda to share some good news.

While Uganda has been enjoying the privilege of two dedicated missionaries, Rev. Houge has been the sole career missionary managing the existing and developing partnerships and relationships between the Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod (LCMS) and the rest of East Africa, including Kenya, Tanzania, Ethiopia, Sudan, and new opportunities in other countries! As the partnerships in East Africa continue to grow, Rev. Houge has found need for some sharing of his responsibilities. Consequently, he extended an invitation to us to move to Nairobi, Kenya, and transition into a position as an Associate Area Facilitator for East Africa, with responsibility for LCMS World Mission's relationships and partnerships in Kenya and Tanzania!

This is the call most likely to be officially

extended to Shauen on Call Day, April 27th, although there does remain a remote possibility of receiving a different assignment. We are sad to be leaving Uganda but very excited about the new opportunities and challenges God has placed before us beyond vicarage.

As a vicar, it was important to rapidly be immersed in the work of a missionary here in Uganda, which precluded time for dedicated immersion-style language and culture learning. In contrast, the move toward Shauen's position as Associate Area Facilitator can progress along a more conventional path, including opportunities for mentorship by Rev. Houge, who has more than 20 years of mission experience in Africa.

Already Shauen has begun transitioning his teaching obligations to coworker Rev. Jacob Gillard. We are trying to sell our truck and car and are cramming to learn as much as we can about Kenya and Tanzania. By May 1st we will move to Nairobi. After settling into our new home there, we will attend a global Lutheran missionary training session in Paraguay. Next, we'll spend several months learning Swahili in Tanzania, followed by our furlough (home-leave) Oct-Dec. Finally we'll be on the field in Nairobi the first week of Jan 2011. Shauen will shadow Rev. Houge as the responsibilities in Kenya and Tanzania are transferred. Praise the Lord for this opportunity!

able approach starts with sending an advance team. This fact-finding team is generally small (for RLC it was two people) and is focused on learning as much as possible about the country and the resources, skills, and strengths of the local churches in several areas. With the Lord's guidance, a natural partnership will take root somewhere along the way. The ad-

advance team from Resurrection visited three parts of Uganda—Lukonda in the central region, Amudat in the far northeast, and Busia in the east. Praise the Lord for a safe and educational trip for the RLC Advance Team and for guidance as they deliberate their next step towards long-term partnership!

RLC expressed an interest in coming to Uganda with a short-term mission team in a long-term commitment. Usually this involves committing to return to the field at least once a year for five years. As a congregation prepares for this kind of long-term partnership in an area, the best possi-
