Facts in Focus

The Evangelical Lutheran Church in Kenya (ELCK)

- Lutheran mission work began in 1948 by the Swedish Lutheran Mission
- Church formed in 1958
- LCMS World Mission partnership began in 1998
- Entered into Altar and Pulpit Fellowship with the LCMS in 2004
- About 130 pastors
- About 200 evangelists
- About 700 congregations and preaching stations
- About 110,000 members
- One seminary
- Two Bible Schools
- About 20 mission training centers
- Has an Episcopal structure with an Archbishop overseeing Bishops in 4 dioceses
- In addition to the Swedish Lutheran Mission (SLM) and LCMS World Mission, the ELCK has partnerships with the Swedish Lutheran Evangelical Association of Finland (SLEAF), World Mission Prayer League (WMPL), the Lutheran Evangelical Association of Finland (LEAF), and the Norwegian Lutheran Mission (NLM)

MTC Manager's Training

Twelve pastors look at Shauen expectantly. He remembers again that he's not in Uganda anymore. As he idly thumbs his Bible and feels that special anxiety that comes when speaking before a group, he begins, "We don't have time today to cover the entire Gospel of Luke, or even just those parts emphasized in the MTC (Mission Training Center) book.

But I think we can learn a lot about Luke by looking closely at one chapter..."

In some ways Shauen feels like he's finally doing the work he's put here to do. Theological Education is among the top priorities for LCMS partnerships across Africa. The Evangelical Lutheran Church in Kenya (ELCK) has numerous partnership opportunities in this area. They have a four-year seminary issuing Bachelor's Degrees for Pastors, a two-year Bible School issuing Certificates for Evangelists, and the Mission Training Center program dispersed across the country which trains laity as Helpers in congregations that don't have a Pastor or Evangelist of their own.

With almost twenty MTCs across Kenya, it's certainly beyond Shauen's capacity to teach at them all. The

ELCK has a coordinator for the MTCs and each center is managed by the Pastor overseeing the area. So Shauen is privileged to participate at this point in the training of the trainers. Four times a year the MTC managers come together for two days of encouragement, fellowship, and a review of the two books to be covered in months ahead. Manager's

training is led by the MTC Coordinator along with those he calls on to assist him, generally one or more of the MTC managers, or for at least one day of this training, Shauen...

Shauen continues, "So let's look at Jesus' parables of the lost things in Luke 15..." With the Scriptures open before them, as is normally the case, his nerves settle and as heads bow down to peer into the text, Shauen's anxieties are replaced by that special joy of gathering around God's Word. Soon the group is deeply involved in discussion and debate that occupies them for most of this second day of training. As the afternoon turns to evening the thoughts of these servants again turn toward their parishes and the five to fifteen congregations they oversee. Pray for these shepherds of God's people in Kenya!

Claude and Rhoda Houge retired from the East Africa mission field they set into motion an opportunity for rest—for ALL of our missionaries in Africa.

After attending a Grace Place retreat in the States, the Hougues suggested to Grace Place that our missionaries could really benefit from a similar program. Grace Place (graceplaceretreats.org) "invites church workers and leaders to take a 'pause point' to reflect on the state

of their whole health, re-tool by learning new health skills and strategies to combat chronic stresses, and then rejuvenate through rest, fellowship and being in God's Word" (taken from their website).

This spring Grace Place came to Africa. Generous sponsors provided for all of the expenses of the gathering—lodging, food, childcare, and so on. For the first time in many, many years, all of our missionaries from across Africa (many of whom had never met each other) came together for a time of rest and fellowship right here on the coast of Kenya.
